

Wealth and Poverty Certificate (CTWLTH)

The Wealth and Poverty Certificate addresses the growing challenges of inequality and poverty in our society, both locally and globally, asking questions like *Why are some so rich and some so poor? Why is there inequality in the world? What would be the cost of growing inequality?* How could we fight poverty together in our community?

Complete a minimum of 18 credit hours including (courses offered in Spring 2017 in red):
